Getting our beloved Healeys on the road and keeping them there is a seemingly never ending saga, not unlike several shows seen on afternoon weekday TV. The objective of this column is to be a forum for members to ask questions, update car statuses with progress reports, etc.

Lynn McKinnie reports:

I had an unusual brake problem on a 40 mile drive early in July. At one point on the drive, I had to slow rather quickly from about 65 mph to 10 mph to make a 120 degree right turn on to a different road. While making the turn, I felt the steering wheel pull to the right. That "Pull" had never happened since I put the car on the road. After that turn and the pull to the right, I stopped several times at intersections with a slight pull to the right. The brake petal felt normal, firm and same amount of travel. I went a few miles out of my way home to buy gas. Other than the slight pull to the right, the brakes were working normally.

Since the brakes were pulling to the right, I assumed the left front brake had a problem of some kind. Two days later, I removed the left front wheel and found brake fluid on the inside of the wheel rim and some brake fluid on the tire sidewall and on the tread. There were drops of brake fluid on the bleed valve, brake pads and bottom of the caliper. I could not determine which individual component was leaking. I removed the brake pads which were coated with silicone brake fluid and had a slippery feeling on the disc contact surface. That is why the brakes pulled to the right when applied.

After wiping the caliper of excess brake fluid, the brake pads were reinstalled. The bleed valve was removed to insure it was seating properly and the hole was clear. I used a Mityvac, a hand actuated vacuum pump to bleed brake cylinders when you don't have someone to pump the brake petal. With the caliper cleaned up, the pads reinstalled and the caliper properly bled; I could apply the brakes and find the leak. At first, I applied light pressure, then gradually more pressure, inspecting the caliper after each application and found no leak. My car has a brake booster, so I started the engine and pushed as hard as I could on the petal. No leak!

I happened to have a slightly used set of brake pads to replace the fluid soaked pads. I drove the car yesterday in the neighborhood; stopping many times and still no leak and no pulling to the right.

My guess is the bleed valve had moved off its seat just enough to leak on the relatively hard slow down to make the hard right turn. I removed the bleed valve in the process of wiping the caliper clean. I did not move the valve in the tightening direction when I removed it. The threads are tight and the wrench was required all the way out. The bleed valve is above the brake pads and if leaking, the brake fluid would fall on the pads.

I'm adding "Check tightness of bleed valves" to my annual Maintenance List.

Jim Richmond reports:

MAKING PROGRESS – SLOWLY

I'm making progress on improving the Bugeye – very slowly. 90 weight GL4 gear oil has been replaced in the steering rack. The timing chain cover that came with the 1275 engine had the catch can for the PCV valve cut off for some unknown reason.

??!!

This has been replaced with one with a correct catch can.

A new water pump has been installed.

A reinforcement plate added to help prevent engine oil leaking.

Next, the clutch and gearbox will be installed.

Ron Borden Reports:

As reported in the May 2020 *Rumblin's* I have installed a new aluminum radiator. The car was driven several times after that with a good reduction in radiator temperature. Last month during one of

the first 100° days of this year I took the car for a test drive. With a 180° thermostat installed, driving several miles at 60 mph and 4000 rpm the temperature stabilized between 186 & 188°. With the old radiator, which was in good condition when replaced but not aluminum, the temperature would have been in the 205° range. So I'm getting at least 15-18° or more reduction in radiator temperature. During the Cruise to Comfort Drive on July 18, covered on pages 2 & 3 above, the temp stayed right at 180° with the ambient temperature in the mid to upper 80's.

Texas Master Naturalist Program

Tina and I have long been interested in the outdoors and had heard about the Texas Master Naturalist program from friends. The program originated in San Antonio but over the 20 some years of its existence it has spread through the state and has been copied in many other states and around the world. The Texas Master Naturalist program is a statewide organization sponsored jointly by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service.

The chapters of the Texas Master Naturalist™ program provide training and volunteer opportunities for individuals who wish to learn about and promote the sustainable use, conservation, and maintenance of our natural resources and who, afterward, are willing to continue serving as volunteers in such endeavors. One of the major parts of this program includes providing a group of volunteers who are not only knowledgeable in many diverse aspects of the environment but are then capable of educating the general public (such as schools and library lecture series) in safeguarding all our natural resources. The program is presented through a collaborative effort of professionals from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and other organizations, as well as past students of the Master Naturalist Program.

After I retired, we finally had time to attend classes and do the volunteer work to become certified. A minimum of 40 hours of volunteer work and 8 hours of Advance training are required each year to be certified. The program is very broad scoped and includes everything from Anthropology to Weather. We spent 2019 going through the Hays County chapter's program and volunteering for various activities. We helped with some outdoor elementary school activities, helped clean out invasive species in a San Marcos park, did a presentation on Blue light at the Texas Dark Skies festival in Dripping Springs, spread wild seed at an Austin water conservation park, and much more. One of the activities we did both last year was to monitor nesting boxes at Dripping Springs Ranch Park twice a week. The nest boxes are targeted for Eastern Bluebirds but we've also had Bewick Wrens and Crested Titmice use them. I've attached some pictures from the nest boxes; the little eggs are incredibly blue.

Training has moved online this year and many volunteer activities had to be curtailed but we've still managed to complete the minimum to stay certified. If you're interested, there are chapters all around central Texas.
