
Winter Wonderland in (Frozen?) Dripping Springs

ing in her stall with no snow/ice but attempting to stay warm in the frigid cold. I red her up at night with my canvas/wool horse blanket which kept her very cozy.



Temps in the house ranged from 47-57 degrees so blankets came in handy even during the day.



When the power finally came on we plugged in our cell phones and whipped up the next meal before it shut off again. Relaying our trials & tribulations

to family and friends also kept us quite entertained. Luckily after the water in our garage apt. thawed 4 days later, showers were much appreciated. The slow receding of the icy remnants kept us homebound for 10 whole days. Fortunately we had a full fridge and freezer. Unfortunately, as it thawed we kept hearing loud cracks and crashes in our yard from all the tree branches that succumbed to the weight of layers of ice and snow for way too many days. Lots of chain sawing and shredding or burning will keep us occupied in the next few months.



Well, we managed to survive and discovered that no pipes actually burst like they did during Christmas in 1989. I'm sure most of us were thinking a drive in our Healeys couldn't come too soon! Thank goodness it's spring!

Their thermostat decided to not work so they and their 2 Labs stayed with us and our 2 big dogs for 4 days. Cozy!

Our neighbor across the street had a fire in their detached garage. No injuries and their home was unharmed. The garage and cars were a total loss.

This was the view Tuesday evening, Feb. 16, from our front porch with emergency vehicles blocking our street for several hours.





TOOL BOX

The purpose of the Tool Box is to assemble, and make available for use by STAHC members, specialty tools that are used in the restoration and/or maintenance of Healeys. In general, such tools will be those that are too expensive for an individual member to acquire for one time, or infrequent use.

Currently, the STAHC Tool Box contains the following:

- Lift-the-Dot Hand Punch. (Punches center hole and prong holes for installation of Lift-the-Dot fasteners for tops and tonneau covers. Moss Motors No. 226-105.)
- Texas Fastening Tool
- Snap Fastening tool
- Valve Guide Reamer size .281 for intake and exhaust standard size valve guides used on all Sprite and Midget A series engines 1958 - 1974
- Engine leveler (for removing or installing an engine)
- Carb Synchronizer
- Colourtune Carb Synchronizer
- Wire Wheel Spoke tool
- 1/8" OD pipe bending tool
- Panel & Trim Removal Tool Set
- CD Workshop Manuel for Sprite MK 2, 3 & 4.
